

## Trees & Other Ramifications: Branches in Nature & Culture

**LAWRENCE**—Visitors to the Spencer Museum of Art can now experience the ways in which trees affect their lives. The exhibition *Trees & Other Ramifications: Branches in Nature & Culture*, on view March 5 through May 24 in the Museum's Central Court, with connected projects at the Natural History Museum and The Commons @ Spooner Hall, offers an openended look at some of the many ways that trees are meaningful to humanity and important in the natural world. *Trees & Other Ramifications* will have a public reception along with the Museum's other spring exhibitions on March 5 at 6:30 PM.

The exhibition, which features prints, drawings, books, and photographs drawn from University of Kansas and area collections, explores both works of art that were inspired by trees and images from the arts and sciences in which trees have served as a metaphor for real and imagined branching systems. For example, you will find works about family trees, the tree of knowledge, and Darwin's evolutionary tree of life.

In alliance with other spring exhibitions and programs concerning climate change, the <a href="Natural">Natural</a>
<a href="History Museum/Biodiversity Research Center">History Museum/Biodiversity Research</a> Center</a> has contributed research on the species of trees seen in some of the exhibited works that allows us to predict the future geographic distribution of those species under different climate change models. The Biodiversity Research Center will also be sharing new research documentation of the remarkable <a href="Bowerbirds of New Guinea">Bowerbirds of New Guinea</a>. As part of their courtship behavior, bowerbirds make elaborate structures that incorporate tree elements and that are sometimes built around saplings.

**Trees & Other Ramifications** is organized by Stephen Goddard, Senior Curator of Prints, working in cooperation with KU's Biodiversity Research Center and the **Spencer Research** 

<u>Library</u>. The exhibition is made possible in part by the generous support of the Elizabeth Schultz Environmental Fund of the Douglas County Foundation, Arthur V. Neis, and <u>Gould Evans</u>

Associates, LC.

The last month of *Trees & Other Ramifications* will coincide with the arrival of world-renowned sculptor <u>Patrick Dougherty</u>. Hosted by the Spencer Museum in cooperation with <u>The Commons</u>, Dougherty will be an artist-in-residence during May, when he will create a tree-branch sculpture outside The Commons @ Spooner Hall. Dougherty has gained an international reputation for his structures and has created hundreds of monumental, site-specific sculptures around the world. His work is constructed from saplings gathered from local sources and shaped into massive, swirling forms as high as 40 feet. Dougherty's residency is made possible in part by the generous support of Reed and Stacey Dillon, the <u>KU School of Architecture and Urban Planning</u>, the <u>Elizabeth Schultz Environmental Fund of the Douglas County Community Foundation</u>, and corporate sponsor <u>Capitol Federal Foundation</u>.

#### Connected Exhibitions on Campus & Beyond

**Trees & Other Ramifications** has inspired several similarly themed shows, on and off campus. The **Spencer Student Advisory Board** will present **Technology/Nature**, a juried student art exhibition opening April 2 in the Kansas Union's SUA Gallery.

As well, two installations are planned at the Natural History Museum: the NHM Student Advisory Board will present *Branching Systems*, also opening April 2; and a new fossil tree display, tentatively titled *Paleotrees*, will open March 5. *Paleotrees* is curated by Bruce Scherting of the Natural History Museum with KU paleobotanist Rudolph Serbet.

\$ / Additional performance on April 17 / As part of the University Dance Company's annual spring concert, KU dance students will perform *Other Ramifications*, an original, choreographic work by Michelle Heffner Hayes inspired by the "branching" activity explored in the Spencer's *Trees & Other Ramifications* exhibition. The movement originated as a two-week, site-specific installation in Marvin Grove during October of 2008. Dance students of Professor Michelle Heffner Hayes responded to different "movement scores" based on the role of the individual in relationship to his or her environment. Students in American Studies recorded these experiments through sound and film, took ethnographic notes during the events, interviewed the dancers about their experiences, then combined these elements in an interactive wiki--a database of Web pages which visitors can edit live. Students in the parallel courses then added their own

commentaries, and made choices about which photos, videos, sound recordings, and writings to include in different places on the wiki. These experiences provided a "map" of the event that became the source material for new choreography.
