# Haitian Art from the Hughes Collection Exhibition highlights Lawrence couple's acquisitions of wide variety of 20<sup>th</sup>-century Haitian artists

**Lawrence, Kansas** — A new exhibition at the Spencer Museum of Art celebrates the 20<sup>th</sup>century visual arts of Haiti through the diverse collection of a Lawrence couple who lived there for four years during the early- to mid-1970s. The Spencer is pleased to present *Haitian Art from the Hughes Collection*, on view in the North Balcony from July 7 through September 16, 2007.

Lawrence residents Harry Hughes—at the time a Public Affairs Officer for the American Embassy—and his wife Mary Lou lived in Haiti from 1972 to 1976 and developed a deep admiration for the nation's art. They eventually established a collection of nearly 100 Haitian works. During a previous stay in the Republic of Dahomey (now the Republic of Benin), Mary Lou, in particular, had made it a point to familiarize herself with the African aesthetic that would later inform her profound interest in Haitian art. In Haiti, she enthusiastically fostered a connection with the community of artists that frequented the Centre d'Art in the capital city, Portau-Prince. Indeed, at the Centre d'Art—a space where artists could express themselves freely, gain instruction, and exhibit their work—Mary Lou became acquainted with many of the painters and sculptors whose creations she would collect.

Haitian Art from the Hughes Collection exhibits works by the "first and second generation" of artists whose continuing creative evolution is often associated with the founding of the Centre d'Art in 1944 by DeWitt Peters, an American conscientious objector who had originally come to Haiti to teach English as an alternative to military service. The exhibition covers many of Haiti's leading painters and sculptors, including Rigaud Benoît, Wilson Bigaud, Murat Brierre, Célestin Faustin, Jacques-Enguérrand Gourgue, Jasmin Joseph, Adam Leontus, Philomé Obin, Salnave Phillipe-Auguste, André Pierre, Ernst Prophète, Robert St. Brice, and Bernard Séjourné.

Works from the Hughes Collection have been previously shown in exhibitions at the Musée d'Art du Collège Saint Pierre in Port-au-Prince, the Brooklyn Museum, the Milwaukee Art Museum, the Ramapo College of New Jersey, Northern Virginia Community College in Alexandria, the Davenport Museum of Art in Iowa, the New Orleans Museum of Art, the Staatliche Kunsthalle in Berlin, and at the City Hall in Washington D.C. A number of works have been reproduced for publication as well, including in such important texts as Ute Stebich's *Haitian Art* and Seldon Rodman's *Where Art is Joy, Haitian Art: the First Forty Years*.

The exhibition was organized by Amanda Martin Hamon, SMA Public Outreach and Special Events Coordinator, and Sean Barker, Loo Family Intern in Education, with much help from Mary Lou and Harry Hughes.
